Project Overview

Project Purpose

Parks will be redeveloping a parcel of land located at 1515 Centre Street South into a vibrant public park space that can be well enjoyed and used by community members. The new redeveloped 201 square metre park will help to reactivate the space in a community (The Beltline) that is considerably deficient in open park space. This project aims to take advantage of an underutilized, unnoticed, and underappreciated park to maximize its value and create urban vitality.

Park Location



Project History

In Spring of 2018, [The Beltline Neighborhood Association](#) was awarded a conceptual drawing grant from Parks Foundation Calgary to provide funding for the creation of a redevelopment concept for Humpy Hollow Park. After procuring a consultant who led a series of stakeholder workshops with the Beltline Neighbourhood Association Board, members from the Beltline Urban Development Committee, the Beltline Parks and Open Spaces Committee, tenants renting space in the McHugh house, as well as a representative from the Ward 8 office, a concept and vision was developed which was then taken to the

Beltline Community Investment Fund (BCIF) Committee to ask for a funding request. The purpose of this funding request was to take this project through detailed design, further engagement with the public, permitting, and construction. This funding request was approved by the BCIF committee in April 2019, then by the Priorities and Finance Committee in December 2019, and finally by Council in January 2020.

Since this time, The City has partnered with DIALOG, a professional consulting firm and has worked through a series of site analysis and concept refinement exercises to create two concepts that are based off of the vision and principles developed in the previous community-led engagement in 2018. Based on the feedback received from the 2020 City-led public engagement, a preferred concept has been developed. The City will next work with DIALOG through the detail design, permitting, and build out of the urban park space with the anticipated Park reopening in Fall, 2021.

Engagement Overview

2018 Community-led Engagement

The feedback received from the previous 2018 community-led engagement was used as a foundation by the current project team and consulting firm to help inform two conceptual design plans that were shared with the public in a City-led engagement program. A summary of what we heard from the 2018 community-led engagement can be found in the graphic below.

2020 City-led Public Engagement

The primary objective of the city-led engagement was to gather feedback on the two conceptual design plans that were developed based off the feedback received during the 2018 community-led engagement. During the city-led engagement, the public was invited to provide feedback on what site features/attributes they liked and disliked about each of the two concept plans.

City-led public engagement took place from June 24 – July 24, 2020. In light of COVID-19 and its implications on in person events, engagement was conducted entirely remotely [online](#). As we were unable to host in-person sessions, the online engagement was extended longer for a total of four weeks. Adjacent land owners and everyone within the Beltline community (businesses and residents) were mailed post cards with guidance on how to provide input online. An information panel was also installed on site (1515 Centre Street South) providing the public with this same information. We also connected with targeted stakeholder groups via email to solicit their feedback about the redevelopment of the park space. Targeted stakeholders that were reached out to include:

- Ward 11 office;
- Ward 8 office;
- The Beltline Neighbourhood Association (BNA);
- 17th Ave Business Revitalization Zone (BRZ);
- Victoria Park Business Improvement Area (BIA);
- 4th Street Business Improvement Area (BIA); and,
- Tenants of the McHugh House

Input from the online survey (355 respondents) as well as email responses received from the targeted stakeholder groups have been used to identify preferences and patterns to help the project team create a final conceptual park design (the preferred concept) that meets the communities' needs.

What We Asked In the 2020 City-led Public Engagement

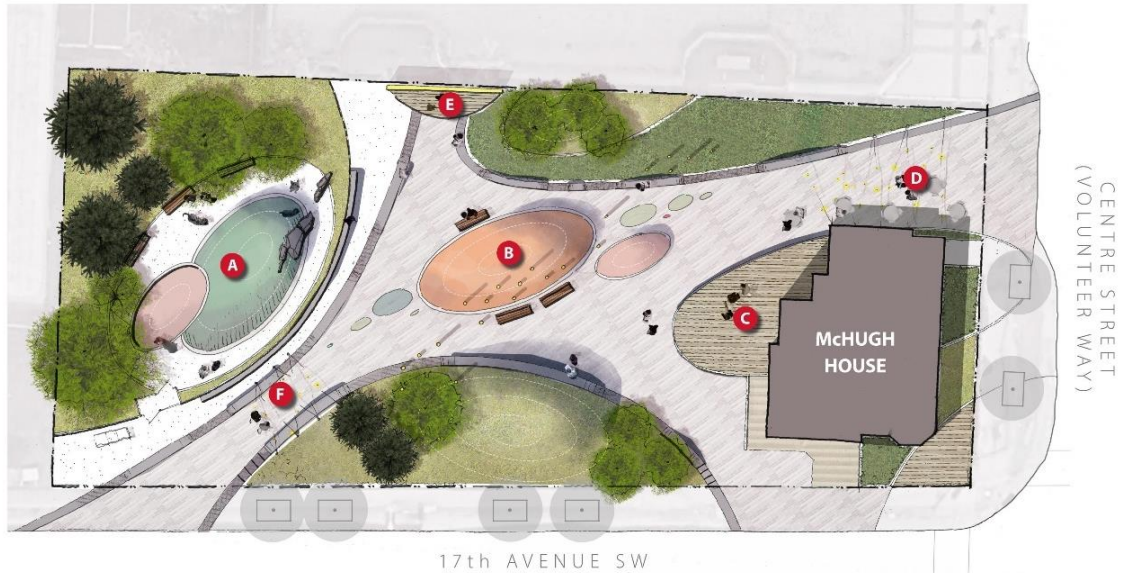
Engagement sought public input through structured questions about the two conceptual design plans seen on the following pages (Concept #1 and Concept #2). Supporting Images, renderings, and precedent photos were provided to give additional context for participants when submitting their feedback.

We asked two demographic questions to see if we were speaking to community members who would be using the new redeveloped park space. We also asked one general question regarding how participants heard about the project. Additionally, we asked participants about the alignment to a vision statement as well as about their preference for renaming the park once redeveloped.

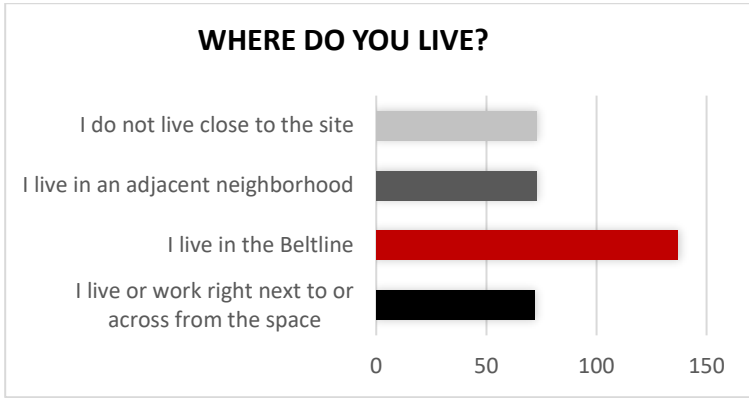

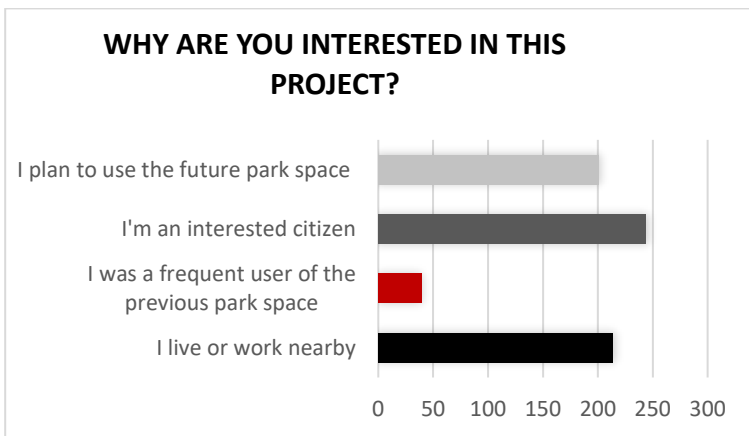

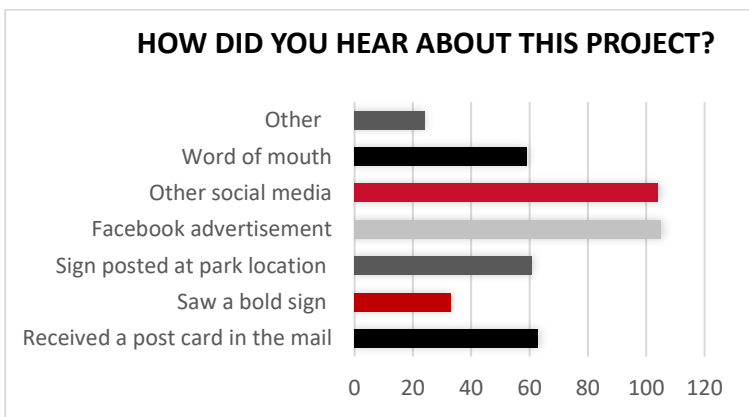

"The photo of the bumpy Hill with climbing poles looks awesome. Would be very unique play space for children"

Twinkle lights

Citizens were generally supportive of the addition of twinkle lights or something similar in the park space.

"Twinkly lights...! I think we need to incorporate way more 'light art' downtown for safety and enjoyment. Loved my friend Caitlind Brown's light installation at Nuit Blanche years ago. Our winters are so long and dark — more light is good!"

"The twinkle lights seem to consider the night time use of the park"

"A fenced in dog park which is so small is basically a waste of space. Most dogs will go on the grass outside the fence and there are better dog parks nearby"

Lack of greenspace/trees

The public thought that there was too much concrete and not enough greenspace/trees incorporated into the design of the park space.

"Not enough green space. The Beltline has enough empty concrete spaces"

The loss of green square footage in the park...The city doesn't need yet another concrete slab replacing a park. There are very few green spaces in this area of the city and losing another would be awful.

Two Stages

Citizens did not like the idea of having two stages in a park of this size.

"I'm somewhere from indifferent to disappointed about the stage- I don't want panhandlers to make my time in the park uncomfortable while I am there with my children so unless its an official and managed stage I think it is a bad idea"

"Not sure why it needs 2 stages"

"Secondary stage doesn't really seem necessary - the park isn't big enough to have two musicians playing at once"

Plaza

The central plaza space is well supported by the public.

"I like adaptable plaza area"

"The central plaza gathering space that'll be good for watching buskers"

"Too much concrete, too much loss of grass/greenery"

"Not sure if there are grassy areas to sit on. I'd prefer less concrete in general"

Lack of dog park

The public was disappointed that concept 2 did not include a dog park component.

"Lack of dog park - while I don't have a dog, many in the area do and space on this end of the beltline for off-leash dogs is lacking"

"No dog park. The east end of the beltline desperately needs one. Dog owners will consistently use the park making the upgrades worth while"

Lack of playful elements

The public indicated that they would have liked to see a playground or more opportunities for play incorporated into this inner-city space.

"Lack of children's' space, really important in inner city neighbourhoods"

"No playground, and nearest one is much further away. Has to be a balance between public space and playground, green space".

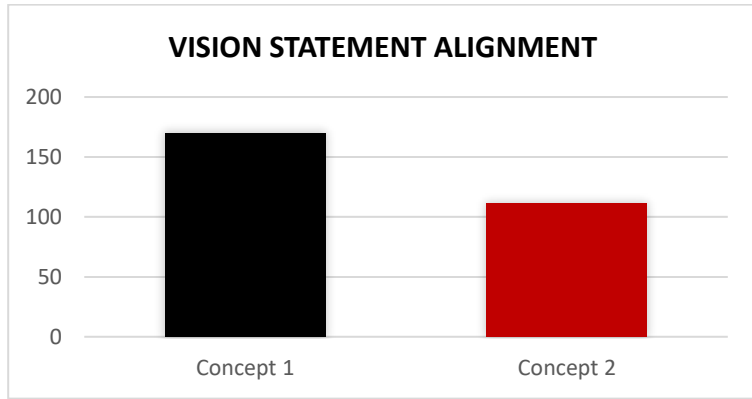

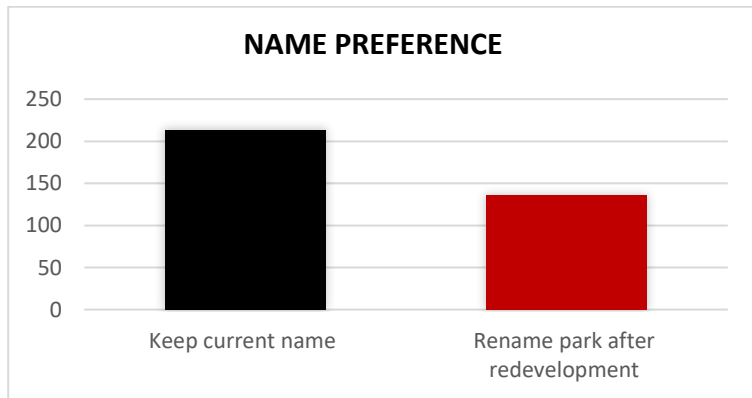


Based on the comments and feedback, the public thought that the vision statement aligned more appropriately with Concept 1 rather than Concept 2 due to the following:

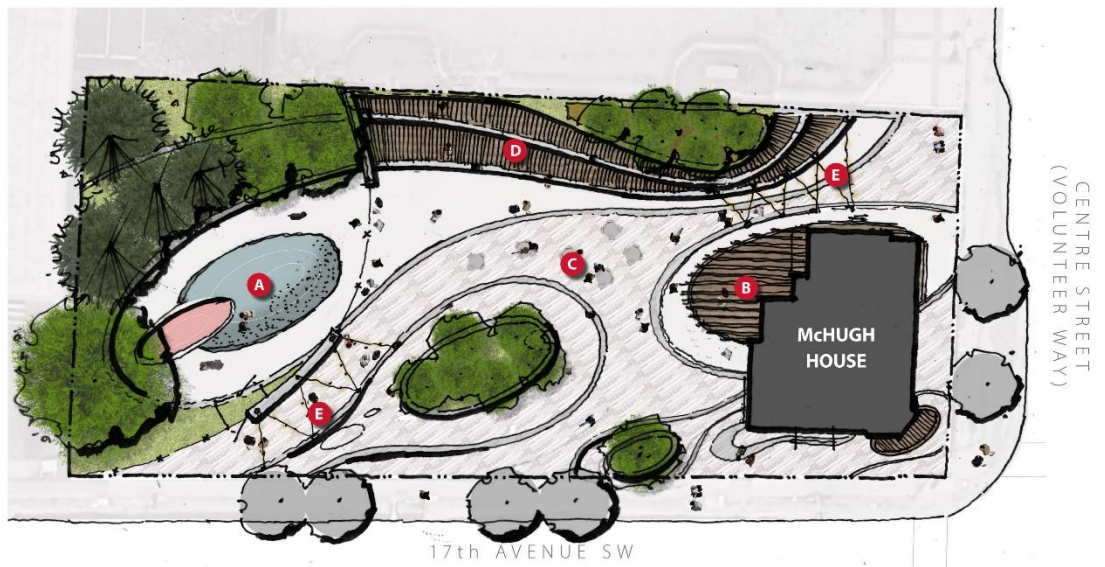

Design Rationale for Preferred Concept

Park Element / Theme	City Response & Details
<p>Urban dog park</p>	<p>Due to high interest levels and positive feedback during the City-led public engagement, The City has included an off-leash area in the preferred concept. The City also recently completed a Downtown Off-Leash Area Study, which indicated that there is a need for more fenced off-leash areas in the downtown, in convenient locations within walking distance of residents. The study actually noted the Beltline community as an area specifically in need. The fenced in dog park located in the preferred concept provides a much-needed amenity for people residing in the east end of the Beltline.</p> <p>Although there were some concerns regarding K-9 waste, urine and their associated odors, and the aesthetic condition of an off-leash component, The City intends to deal with these concerns by specifying dog-park specific synthetic groundcover and developing a suitable maintenance regime for the park space.</p>
<p>Multi-Use Seating</p>	<p>Although both Concept 1 and Concept 2 presented numerous seating opportunities and configurations, comments from targeted stakeholder outreach and feedback from the general public suggested that seating capacity be increased due to the site’s prime location between the Stampede Grounds and the 17th Avenue main commercial strip. In addition, the analysis of Beltline Parks and open spaces conducted by DIALOG underscored the importance of both seating capacity and variety of seating for a successful urban space.</p> <p>As a result of engagement feedback and research, seating opportunities were increased in the Preferred Concept. The edge condition along 17th Avenue was redesigned to further open the site to the street and offer seating opportunities in the form of seat walls and planter edges. In addition, a large flexible “seating wave” was incorporated into the design, offering ample flexible seating, with an excellent view of the stage and 17th Avenue and opportunities for informal play on site.</p>
<p>Covered Stage & McHugh House Terrace</p>	<p>Stages were shown in both Concept 1 and Concept 2. Concept 1 included two stages - a primary and secondary stage whereas a single covered stage was shown as part of Concept 2. It was noted during DIALOG’s analysis of Beltline Parks that the Beltline Parks lacked a covered stage. In some parks, such as Central Memorial Park, temporary shelters are regularly used for events with hot or inclement weather conditions.</p>

	<p>The public reacted positively to the notion of the stage, although there were some critical comments of the dual stage idea represented in Concept 1. It should also be noted that respondents reacted positively to the close relationship between the stage and McHugh House.</p> <p>As a result of engagement feedback and the Beltline Parks analysis, a single covered stage was incorporated into the design immediately adjacent to McHugh House. Further, the design of this space has been considered to act as a terrace for the McHugh House. A universal access ramp can be incorporated into the design of this covered stage / terrace and offer informal seating and a gathering space when there is not a scheduled event taking place.</p>
<p>Site Circulation / Layout</p>	<p>During site analysis, a strong informal SW to NE pedestrian route (desire line) was identified across the site. This desire line is clearly evident in Concept 1 and more subtly into Concept 2.</p> <p>Public and targeted stakeholder feedback reinforced that this desire line is important to the site's pedestrian circulation and for this reason it was incorporated into the Preferred Concept. This circulation pattern further influenced the layout of some important site elements, such as the seating along 17th Avenue and placement of the twinkle lights.</p> <p>Although lack of greenery and trees were mentioned as a minor concern in both Concept 1 and Concept 2, it should be remembered that the space is small and located in an urban area along the busy 17th Avenue. The project team has done their best to balance the greenspace and trees on site with hardscape areas in the preferred concept and intends to include species of vegetation that provide a variety of color and textures throughout different months of the year.</p>
<p>Open Central Plaza</p>	<p>Although both Concept 1 and Concept 2 showed strong plaza elements, public feedback indicated that the more open plaza shown in Concept 2 was preferred. The public responded positively to the flexibility offered by the open design. As a result, an open plaza is shown in the Preferred Concept. There is opportunity for flexible programming, and when not programmed, site furnishings can fill the space for casual use.</p>
<p>Lighting</p>	<p>Proposed lighting, specifically twinkle lights, received extremely positive feedback from the public and from targeted stakeholder engagement. Ensuring that the park space is lit during evening hours is important to stakeholders. As such twinkle lights were incorporated into the preferred concept in both the SW and NE corners of the site. These elements mark the entrances to the site, and along with inviting seating and directional paving, will help pull people into the site even on dark winter evenings.</p>

Other Project Considerations Influencing the Design

This piece of land (1515 Centre Street South) is designated as Special Purpose – Community Service District (S-CS) and everything that has been proposed in the preferred concept is a “permitted use” for this type of land use designation.

Funding for this project comes from the Beltline Community Investment Fund (BCIF). The BCIF is to be used for projects on public lands or within public Rights-of-way within the Beltline related to public realm improvements. We feel that the preferred concept for the redevelopment of Humpy Hollow Park opens the park space up to 17th Ave SW and provides a great enhancement to the public realm in the east end of the Beltline.

As part of the preliminary analysis work for this project, DIALOG conducted a brief analysis of all parks and opens space located in the Beltline community. Using the *Centre City Parks: Open Space Management Plan* as a point of departure, these parks and open spaces were analyzed through a community design lens with the intent to inform park amenities to include in the redevelopment of the park space. Conclusions from this analysis heavily influenced the park elements that were included in the preferred concept.

Please note that as we take the preferred concept through detail design and the Development Liaison (DL) permitting process, there may be changes to ensure that the design aligns with City planning policies. The final design will take into consideration the feedback that we have obtained to date from the community and public engagement and balance that with City planning policies, bylaws, and priorities.

Next Steps

Fall - Winter 2020 – Design, Permitting, & Tendering: The preferred concept will be taken through detail design, review, and permitting. Once finalized the project will be procured to retain a contractor who will be responsible for constructing the new park space.

Spring - Summer 2021 – Construction of park: The park will be constructed by the successful proponent. It is estimated that construction of the new park space will take approximately five (5) months to complete.

Fall 2021 – Target park opening: Following construction completion, the park will open for use by the public.
